Ewan 'Sid' Siddall

SYRACUSE — Ewan "Sid" Siddall died May 13, 2010, in Syracuse.

He was born October 16, 1921, on the Mosher Farm in Aurora. The family moved to Dumplin Hill Road in Sempronious outside of Moravia, in 1922.

Ewan is survived by his wife, Marion, of Syracuse; and four sons, Roger (Susan), of Seattle, Wash., Douglas (Kim), Eric (Jan), both of Syracuse, and Brian (Brenda), of Ithaca. Ewan is also survived by seven grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Ewan was preceded in death by his parents, Ernest and Margaret (Vogt); and four brothers, Elwin Leo Karl, Hubert Ivan, Alan Noel and Elmer Quentin.

Sid loved competition; he was a catcher for the Moravia High baseball team, ran track, played tennis, soccer and was on the basketball and table tennis teams. He spent his entire working career working in the grocery business. He worked in the Moravia grocery store until he enlisted in the Air Corps in 1942 becoming a B-17 navigator as part of the 8th Air Force, 379th Bomb Group stationed in England. His plane, the Ronny Boy, was shot down on Aug. 24, 1944, south of Berlin, Germany. He was sent to Stalag Luft III and ended up in Stalag 7A, Moosburg, Germany, until he was liberated by Patton's Army in April, 1945.

Ewan married Marion Moe on June 2, 1946, and they lived in New Hyde Park, where he managed the Grand Union. He moved his family to Throop, in 1954, and he managed the Auburn Market Basket. He then went to work for Acme Markets as a manager and supervisor for many years in the Upstate New York region. He retired from the grocery business in the mid 1980s, working and volunteering part time at the Auburn YMCA until 2002, when he developed Parkinson's disease.

Ewan was a man of deep faith and was a member of Redeemer Lutheran Church in Auburn, for more than 50 years. The last few years of his life were spent at the Jewish Home at Menorah Park in Syracuse.

Our father loved his family and took pride in his work. Sid loved playing tennis, pitch and rooting for the Yankees. He was loved by many, and his presence will be missed by all that were fortunate enough to have known him.

Services will be held at 6 p.m. Monday, May 17 at Atonement Lutheran Church, 116 Glenn Ave., Syracuse.
